Working Together to Protect the Region's Dark Sky

This year brings the welcome news that the nearby mountain town of Julian, California, has attained the rank of IDA Dark Sky Community. Julian now joins Borrego Springs as California's only two IDA Dark Sky Communities. Both communities are located in the unincorporated, rural backcountry of eastern San Diego County.

Julian's designation was made possible in large part by a change in our County's lighting ordinance. On November 18, 2020, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted new rural lighting standards that will help preserve night skies free from light pollution. This change allowed Julian to join Borrego Springs as an IDA-designated International Dark Sky Community.

The lighting code change was a multi-year effort by both the Borrego Springs Dark Sky Coalition and the Julian Dark Sky Network. Our groups worked with the County's Department of Land Use and Environmental Planning,

together with the strong support of County Supervisor Jim Desmond (for Borrego) and Supervisor Dianne Jacobs (for Julian).

The new standards create a "Zone C" overlay for dark sky areas with regulations that help preserve the night sky as future development occurs. These rural areas in Zone C will have stricter lighting regulations than those in the urban areas.

At a community meeting, the County Planning staff summarized the purpose of the project, "....to update the Light Pollution Chapter of the Regulatory Code to reflect current International Dark Sky Association (IDA) standards and for consistency with the state and federal laws. The County's goal is to identify light pollution standards that meet or exceed IDA requirements that are both easy to adopt and implement for specific regions of the unincorporated County."



Close to Borrego Springs and Julian are two large observatories, Palomar Observatory and Mount Laguna Observatory, both of which have codified, dark sky lighting limits. In addition, we are fortunate to have the 600,000-acre Anza-Borrego Desert State Park, which carries the IDA Dark Sky Park designation, surrounding Borrego Springs and nearly bordering Julian. From the earliest days of Julian's quest to become a Dark Sky Community, there has been a close relationship between the Borrego Dark Sky Coalition and the Julian Dark Sky Network, and that mutual support will continue. By working together, all these organizations have increased exponentially the awareness and protection of our dark sky region in southern California.

Dark Sky Outreach, Education, and Programs - The weekly Farmer's Market is the Coalition's main outreach to the community. For 14 weeks in the winter and spring, a display is set up from 8 a.m. until noon. The exhibit attracts visitors and local residents curious to learn more about good outdoor lighting, see samples of recommended fixtures, ask questions about their specific property, check on upcoming

stargazing events, and find out more about what it means to be a Dark Sky Community.



Many visitors come to Borrego Springs to stargaze and photograph. Borrego's dark night sky and the IDA designation greatly benefit our tourist-based economy. While it was not possible to present in-person stargazing programs for most of 2020-2021 due to the pandemic, we provided handouts with recommended locations for good night sky viewing and night sky photography, with tips about supplies and safety.
